The collaboration of everyone involved resulted in a robust Incident Action Plan which was reviewed and implemented on a daily basis. The IMT continues to meet twice per month, and the structure of the team has not changed, however the personnel assigned to these positions have changed with staff transitions and retirements. However, it speaks to the strength of the Incident Command System that a position is a role, and not a person. A new person is able to be trained, briefed, and moved into an assignment without compromising the integrity of the operation, which is to be expected with an operational period that has lasted over 300 days. All Incident Management Team members have completed ICS100 and NIMS 700 training. Others on the team have made it a priority to obtain additional training in order to be prepared in a variety of emergency situations. During the pandemic, there have been many safety protocols put in place and support offered to LTC students and staff which were spearheaded by our IMT. For example, our IT Command Staff prepared our staff and students to use technology to learn from home. In order to assist in this transition, 146 laptops were deployed to students and 35 portable Wi-Fi hotspots were distributed, providing online access for those without internet service. We also looked to expand college resources to the broader Lakeshore community. Boosting our Wi-Fi signals and removing passwords at our Sheboygan and Manitowoc locations turned our parking lots into safe hotspots, helping to address equity gaps in broadband access. This service continues to be offered in our communities. Under an exemption of the Safer at Home Order, priority public safety courses resumed on April 23rd. Our healthcare faculty and students returned to campus to complete lab-based learning on April 27th. We established strict physical distancing and health procedures to protect the health of these students and faculty. The IMT coordinated
MATC – Joshua Cotillie	e r Laurie Grigg	abruptly or permanently shifting to 100% virtual learning and student finishing their course work on time. In February 2020, before the worldwide COVID pandemic was widely understood and acknowledged, Joshua proactively coordinated a cross-functional collegewide team of expert operational, financial, public safety, communications, and health care faculty and staff to conduct a preemptive case study exercise for a theoretical pandemic. Using the emerging COVID virus as the example, Joshua established the full parameters and details of the exercise, and led the team through hours of strategizing, brainstorming, and action step planning. When the situation turned into the pandemic we have now experienced, it was Joshua's foresight and the results of the exercise that put Madison College in a position where we were ready to react with swiftness and precision. However, Joshua has really shined brightest during this year since the pandemic was recognized as such. Joshua has been the lead person at the college for keeping up to date on the latest science and regulatory guidance; led discussions and decision-making on controlling facility access and risk mitigation protocols; established room capacity and physical barrier criteria for every space in the college's multiple campuses (over 1.3 million square feet); coordinated information-gathering and decision-making related to testing and vaccination planning; and created an entirely new operation of COVID screeners, including hiring, scheduling, and managing their efforts in screening all potential entrants to college facilities.

			As of 2/26/21, there has been over 410,500 surveys for health screening completed. He has guided the college seamlessly through the pandemic, ensuring access to the building, as needed, for over 2000 employees, over 15,000 students, and hundreds of vendors. He has been in close contact with State and local Public Health officials. Through Joshua's work, the college has been able to safely offer numerous critical events like elections, graduations, and other activities that allow people to safely engage during the pandemic. Joshua is also on the COVID-19 Vaccination Task Force to research, procure, and manage COVID-19 testing for our health care faculty and students so they can participate in clinicals timely and for our student athletes so they can safely compete this spring. He approaches these challenges with a great attitude. He has taken on this significant leadership role while maintaining his duties as the Risk Manager and all that entails; emergency phone calls on weekends dealing with water leaks and mitigating damages as quickly as possible; workers compensation processes and getting employees to return to work timely; construction/remodeling safety issues; etc. I know that many of my colleagues feel the same way and support the nomination for Joshua for this honorable award. We cannot think of anyone who deserves this award more during the year of this pandemic!

WTC	Covid Door Screeners/Sanitizers	Dan Murphy c/o Safety Committee	A group of individuals that were dedicated to door screen and sanitize labs during the Covid pandemic. The door screeners are stationed at the academic building entrance to ensure students and staff were wearing a mask, completing the campus Covid exposure survey, and taking their temperature. The lab sanitizers monitored computer and health labs to ensure proper distancing was taking place and proper sanitation was happening after the equipment was finished being used. Door screeners are an essential part of Western's COVID19 Phased Return Plan. They have ensured that all individuals entering Western's buildings are wearing masks and wearing them appropriately. During early phases of Western's Phased Return Plan, they took temperatures of all who entered the facilities, and they made sure the required electronic illness screening forms were completed before individuals entered. The door screeners have been a key component of Western's efforts to provide learning and working environments that are safe – environments where positive cases, exposures, and spread are mitigated. The effectiveness of Western's door screening model is illustrated clearly in the results the College achieved. Western has had between 100-350 people on campus each day since September of 2020. It has tracked the following as evidence of effective safety protocols and practices: 69 total positive cases on campus since September of 2020 Two instances of identified transmission (both in the residence hall) Zero instances of identified transmission in face-to-face classes
