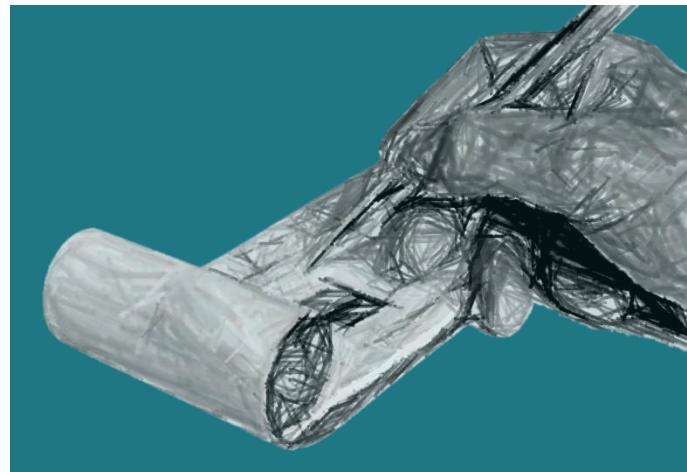
Impact on International Students and Immigration Policies

Colleges have had to adapt quickly to these regulatory changes, leading to administrative and legal complexities.



The Plan to Dismantle the Department of Education

One of the most controversial proposals from the Trump administration has been the plan to [dismantle the Department of Education](#). Only Congress can get rid of the agency, so the executive order would mostly amount to a messaging tactic. But the Trump administration can take other steps to make the agency a shell of itself, from cutting staff to stopping some programs. Advocates argue that decentralizing education policy would give states more control and reduce federal oversight. However, critics warn that such a move could undermine national education standards, reduce funding for public schools and colleges, and create disparities in access to higher education. If implemented, this plan could lead to significant disruptions in federal financial aid programs and regulatory oversight, forcing institutions to navigate an uncertain landscape with fewer resources and less guidance.
