“Overview of U.S. Secret Service National Threat Assessment Center Behavior-Based Approach to Preventing Targeted Violence” | *National Threat Assessment Center, US Secret Service*

This presentation will highlight the National Threat Assessment Center’s foundational role in the field of behavioral threat assessment and targeted violence prevention. It will include an overview of NTAC’s latest research on incidents of targeted violence in schools and communities, as well as the behaviors and life circumstances of those who conduct an attack. It will also describe the U.S. Secret Service behavioral threat assessment model, available resources, and our multidisciplinary approach to identify, assess, and intervene with individuals exhibiting concerning or threatening behaviors to reduce their risk of causing harm.

“Safeguarding Tomorrow: Ensuring Youth Protection in Higher Education” | *James Bourgeois, Presidium*

Youth protection in higher education is a paramount concern, as higher ed. institutions serve as hubs for young individuals transitioning into adulthood. This presentation delves into the critical aspects of safeguarding the well-being of minors within the higher learning environment. We will explore various dimensions of youth protection, including foundational policies and procedures, screening requirements, necessary training, and reporting procedures. This presentation aims to equip stakeholders in higher education with the knowledge, tools, and strategies necessary to create a safe environment for the staff, students, and youth to thrive and succeed. By prioritizing youth protection, we can foster a culture of trust, respect, and empowerment, laying the foundation for a brighter and more promising future for our communities.

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“Management Risk in College Student Populations with Mental Health Concerns” | *Jayme Bowman and Dan Squires, Fox Valley Technical College*

“Mental health concerns in college students is a critical issue facing those of us at Colleges and Universities who are charged with educating, developing, and keeping students safe. More students report struggling with a mental health concern within the last 12 months than in decades prior. Campuses are working to address student needs including housing instability, financial distress, and food insecurity. College Conduct, Campus Security, Student Services, and Instructional staff are faced with the difficult task of addressing behavior and triaging needs with limited resources on campus. Although many communities have quality community-based resources, the immediacy of the need and challenge to access timely services at the level of care needed create opportunities for us to reassess the role our College plays in assisting students to stabilize their mental health and meet their basic needs.

This session will look at the scope of the mental health crisis that our students, and our College at large, is facing. We will explore strategies Fox Valley Technical College employs to promote prevention and enhance wellness, intervene during mental health emergencies, and build mental health awareness and skills in the campus community. We will discuss systems in place to help create clarity, transparency, and consistency in how situations are addressed and documented. You will have an opportunity to reflect on your own College’s systems and generate ideas to bring back to your campuses.”
